## Online Payment Security Reminder

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the CCB continues to see an increase in online payment transactions and services within Nevada's cannabis industry. This shift has resulted in a higher risk for payment fraud for establishments and individuals alike.

**Recognize Red Flags:** Closely check for spelling or grammar errors in the sender's email address, domain name, and message.

**Stop and Review:** Double check and review payment instructions or invoices prior to completing a transaction.

**Verify Authenticity:** Use an alternate known contact to confirm suspicious payment instructions.

**Educate Employees:** Offer training exercises for employees to test their knowledge of how to spot/react to scams.

# Frequently Asked Questions

*Q: Is delta-8 THC considered THC?*

A: Yes. NRS 453.139 “THC” defined. “THC” means:

1. Delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol;
2. Delta-8-tetrahydrocannabinol; and
3. The optical isomers of such substances.

*Q: Do I need a license from the CCB to make or sell products containing delta-8 THC?*

A: Products exceeding 0.3% THC, including delta-8 and delta-9 THC, would be considered cannabis. As such, a license from the CCB would be required in order to make it or sell it.

*Q: Can I grow cannabis at home?*

A: Medical cannabis patients may grow up to 12 plants at home if an appropriate reason is selected when applying for a Medical Marijuana Patient Card. Cards are issued through the Nevada Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public and Behavioral Health.

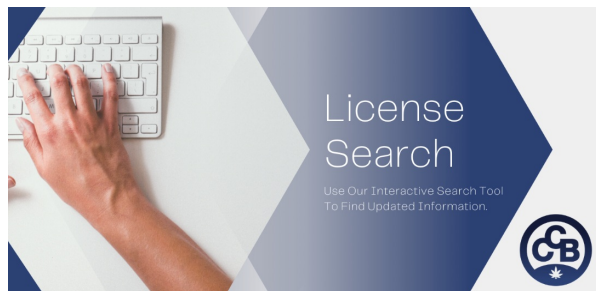
Adult-use consumers may grow up to six plants at home, which must be more than 25 miles away from a dispensary.
